Maths - Counting Coins

- three star worksheets if you feel very confident with counting coins

If you do not have access to a printer, you can complete the challenges on paper and use coins that you have in your home \cdot

Numeracy - Ordering numbers

There are two sheets attached to practise ordering numbers. Choose the sheet which will challenge you more. If you don't have a printer, write the numbers in your jotter.

You can use the attached number line or 100 square to help you.

Extra challenge A: roll 2 dice· How many 1 and 2 digit numbers can you make? Write them in order, from smallest to biggest·

Extra Challenge B: roll 3 dice· How many 2 and 3 digit numbers can you make? Write them in order, from smallest to biggest·

Maths - Pictograms

We are going to use a different type of graph this week to show information: a pictogram. Pictograms use a little picture to show how many of a certain item there is. Try out this game to see an example of a pictogram.

Use the sheets in the assignment to have a go at creating a pictogram.

There are 4 sheets, you can do as few or as many as you like.

- Page 1: Create a pictogram using information about a class's favourite fruit.
- Page 2: Answer questions about the pictogram.
- Page 3: Do your own survey about people's favourite fruits (phone round family and friends) and draw a pictogram.
- Page 4: Create a pictogram about anything you want.

Success Criteria:

Draw the number of smiley faces to match the number of tally marks in the table for each fruit: Each \odot shows 2 people, if you want to show 1 person, you draw half a smiley face: Take your time and draw neatly:

Numeracy - Design a Board Game

Use your knowledge of addition and subtraction to create a board game. You can use the template that is attached or create your own design. There is a net of a dice attached that you can build if you don't have one at home.

Your game should have addition and/or subtraction questions written in each square on the board, when someone lands on a square they must answer the question written on it, if they get the answer wrong they must move back to the space they were on before.

Make your game as interesting as possible, you could add things like traps to move people back spaces or secret passages to move people further up the board, make it as exciting as you can.

You could also give your game a theme, you could set it in the land of dinosaurs or in outer space, you might want to base it on your favourite book or film, the choice is yours.

Once you have finished creating your game start playing it, you will be able to practise your numeracy skills and have fun at the same time!

Literacy - Listening & Talking - Create a Quiz

Entertain your family by creating your own quiz. Your quiz could include questions about your favourite books, films or interests. It could even be questions all about you.

First write down some questions, remember you need to know the answers, then using a clear voice read these out to your family \cdot

If more than one person is playing then you might want to ask them to write their answers down on a piece of paper rather than shouting them out. Once you have asked all of your questions you will need to use your listening skills to listen to everyone's answers and using a clear voice tell them if they were correct.

Points to remember when presenting to an audience.

- Speak clearly
- Be aware of the volume of your voice, can everyone hear you?
- Use eye contact
- Be confident when answering questions
