

Activity 1	RWI Speed Sounds	Red Words	<u>Using Scots Words</u>	Grammar	Reading
Literacy	Please see the information sheet called Speed Sounds in this week's home learning folder. Each day, your child can access a short 10-15 minute speed sound lesson through www.ruthmiskin.com. The videos are available for 24 hours. Please note, we have added in an extra writing task to support the new sound covered.	Choose 3 - 5 new red words to learn today. Try to practice them a little every day this week. Red Word Bingo: Make your own set of bingo boards like the ones in the picture. On a piece of paper, draw a line to split it in half, then two lines going the other way to split it into 6 boxes. In each box, write a red word. This should be a mix of red words you are learning this week and those you already know. Make a bingo board for every player - sometimes players have a couple of words that are the same as each other, and sometimes they have the same word twice for extra practise. Now cut lots of little bits of paper and write those same words on them. One word on each piece. If you have the same word twice on your board, you will need two bits of paper with that word on it. Now play! Take it in turns to pick up a piece of paper and read a word. The first player to spot that word on their board	This week we are learning lots about Scottish culture. Please read the file called alphabetical order which contains a number of different tasks for you to work on. There is a game and song on Education City that you could try too. Log into Education City and go to classwork, then click on P2 (Mrs Marrins, but its for all P2's). Activity 2 Numeracy and Maths	The Daily 5 Each day, complete the 'Daily 5' - 5 mental maths questions to keep your number skills fresh. If you're not sure which sums are in your challenge zone, try the 'mild' ones first. If you can answer them quickly and without having to really think about them then you need to try a hotter challenge. You can find these sums attached to the assignment, or in this week's home learning folder.	At school, we have been playing some of the basic facts number games. These games are designed to help the children learn addition and subtraction, doubling and halving facts quickly. We are hoping that the children can answer the questions within 3 seconds and without using their fingers. (It is totally fine if your child takes longer than 3 seconds and is using their fingers, but the more we play them, the quicker and easier the questions will become.) Your task is to play some of the black or yellow basic facts games with either a sibling or an adult. Try to play a different game each day. Activity 3 Other Curricular Areas	Scots Poems Tonight is burns night; a special night in Scotland where we enjoy Scottish poetry, music, food and more. To help us celebrate we are going to learn a Scots poem. Today, your challenge is to choose a poem to learn- read them all and find one that you like. Some are longer than others so you can choose to learn all the verses for extra challenge, or just the first verse. When you have chosen your poem, take it one line at a time. An adult can read it you, and you can say it back – just like we do in class (my turn, your turn). You will need to practice each line a few times to help you remember it. Perhaps you can think of some actions to help you remember, just like when we learn songs and rhymes in class.	Scottish Art Task On 25 th January, people all over Scotland celebrate Burns Night to remember Robert Burns. Can you make and design something Scottish? You can make or draw whatever you would like. Here are some ideas for you:	Everyone appears to be finding this lockdown a bit harder than the one we had back in March. We all have to find ways to keep smiling, helping others and be kind to one another. This week make a homemade gift for someone. Use what you have round the house to make something that will make them smile. Write a little message on it if you would like. There is a story called 'Kindness' read by Mrs Marrins in the files section, under 'Stories and songs'.	IDL – Scottish Birds Go on a scavenger hunt looking for birds nearby. You could go out for a walk or just into your garden. Somewhere with trees or bushes is ideal as birds like to hide in them! See how many different types of birds you can find. Can you find a large, small, flying, drinking, singing or hopping bird? You can use the bird spotter and/or bird hunt sheets to help. In winter food can be difficult for birds to find. Can you help by putting some food out for them? You can make bird feeders using pinecones, toilet rolls, peanut butter or lard and seed. Or you can even give birds scraps of food from your kitchen (stale bread, fruit, veg, nuts, cereal). For more instructions on these ideas, please look at the sheets provided.
