On Thursday you can hear about Dalhousie Castle




On Friday you can hear about Borthwick Castle

## The Highland Cow



#### 10 facts about Highland Cows

- 1 Highland cows are native to Scotland.
- 2- Highland cows are one of the oldest types of cow in the world.
- 3 A male Highland cow is a bull, a female is a cow, a baby is a calf and a group is herd.
- 4 The Highland cows we usually see have ginger coats but there are also breeds which have grey, white, and black coats.
- 5 When Highland cows become friends often licking each other or play fight.
- 6 They use their large handlebar shaped horns to dig up snow and find food in winter. They also use their horns to defend themselves against predators.
- 7 Male Highland cow's horns tend to be thicker and curve forward. Female Highland cow's horns are thinner and curve upwards.
- 8 -The Highland cow's long shaggy coat has 2 layers. A warm undercoat and a protective oily outercoat. This help to keep them warm and dry and also keep the snow off during winter.
- 9 When a mummy Highland cow has a baby, the calf can stand almost right away. The calf quickly learns to walk and knows who its mummy is. The cow will look after and feed her baby for about 6 months.
- 10 Highland cows spend most of their day eating or grazing and can eat around 70kg of grass every day.


# Scottish Vegetables -

Sometimes when you have had a potato for a little while it starts to sprout, like this one. If you plant it you can grow more potatoes.






Ideas to explore the story further

#### Health and Wellbeing:

- Cuddle up together to share a story, maybe one of your favourite bears could join you.
- Talk together about the different feelings of the characters in the story and learn more about emotions. How did Baby Bear feel when he found that Goldilocks had broken his chair? How did Goldilocks feel when she woke up to see the 3 bears? How did the 3 bears feel when they realised that someone was in their house?

#### Literacy:

- Listening to a story from beginning to end
- Talking about how stories have a title, author, illustrator, beginning and end
- Talking about the people, characters and events in the story
- Talking about a favourite part of a story
- Predicting what might happen next
- Can you read the story to me? Retelling a story in your own words with or without the pictures in the book
- Making up your own story through role play, drawing pictures or writing
- Be an author and illustrator by writing, drawing your own story in a homemade book
- Are there any animals in the story that hibernate during winter?
- What are Baby Bears called?

#### Numeracy:

- Sequencing of events, could you draw a story map of the events?
- -What order did Goldilocks do things in when she was in the 3 bear's house?
- -There are lots of references to big, medium and small in the story. Can you sort some things in your house or your toys into big, medium and small?

- Counting how many characters there are in the story you could look back through the book together and make a tally
