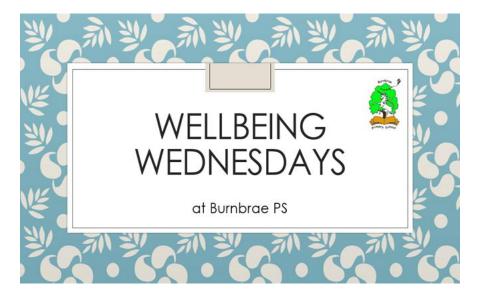
British Science Week 2021

British Science Week Competition

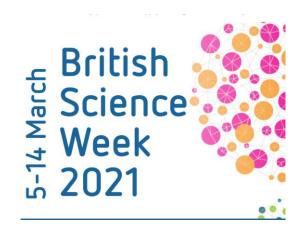

Going back to School- It's okay to worry!

It's completely normal to have a lot of different feelings about coming back to school. Here are some tips and activities that can make the transition back to school a little easier.

Planning ahead

There are some things that will be different at school and a lot of things that will be the same! Use this template to write a list of things that will and won't change at school.

Changes:

- · Physical distancing from others in class and school.
- Frequent hand washing and hygiene measures.
- Moving around the school following the one way systems.
- Your teacher will be wearing a mask in class.
- Your teacher may hold more lessons outside.

Things that will stay the same:

- Your teachers and your friends will be really happy to see you.
- Your safety and wellbeing is priority.
- You will be continuing to learn your usual subjects.
- · You will still have your break and lunch and time outside

Supporting new changes and routines

Here are some ideas on how you can help make the transition back to school easier.

- Work with your child to create a morning and afternoon routine to get ready to go to school and for the transition home. Here is an example. It is helpful to use visual pictures of activities and to use a timer or countdown to let children know how long they have left on each activity.
- Social stories can help children learn what to expect, what other people may be thinking and ways they could respond. Use this Social story to explain the transition back to school and some changes to expect.
- Have a chat about going back to school. Use the list of things that will and won't change along with the social story above to talk about feelings about going back to school calmly.

Feeling anxious about going back to school

Even after preparing, It's normal to still feel anxious about returning to school. It may take some time to adapt.

- · Talk about how your child is feeling using this Emotion chart.
